Did you know that Tucson Police Department handled more than 1,700 calls over the last six months in the Palo Verde Park Neighborhood boundaries?

Nevertheless, neighbors are reporting that vehicle break-ins or petty larceny or mail theft are still at numbers that are too high. Methadone clinic moving in at Broadway and Jessica

Neighbors learned recently that Community Medical Services is opening a methadone clinic where Focus Employment Services was formerly.

As a "medical use," there is no notice requirement and no zoning change required.

Neighbors are torn between understanding the need for treatment, particularly in this era of the opioid crisis, and wanting to see responsible management of the facility.

Neighborhood leadership has engaged the Ward 2 Council office and it is our expectation that they will help facilitate a meeting between neighbors and property owners to help establish a set of expectations that will allow for the smooth delivery of care for those in need of services.

We will keep you updated as more details become available.

Consider Neighborhood Watch

Sgt. Jeremy Williams encouraged neighbors last week to consider starting Neighborhood Watch.

Vacation crime prevention checklist

- When the mercury rises, Tucsonans head out of town if they can. Tucson
 Police have provided a few tips to make your home safe in your absence:
- Secure windows and sliding glass doors with a dowel or bar
- Put several lights on timers and consider installing motion lights
- Put tools and ladders away
- Suspend newspaper delivery
- Have your mail held at the post office
- Ask a friend or trusted neighbor to check on your house to remove clues you aren't home, such as election materials left behind on your door
- Don't make big announcements of your vacation plans on social media or your message machine that you are on vacation

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
