THE HISTORY HUB

Did you know that Palo Verde Park was originally the preferred site for the regional east side library, now located on Wilmot Road?

On Oct. 21, 1963, 200 people jammed into the City Council chambers - almost all of them a well-organized group living around Kellond School - to advocate for the library to be sited at the park. Ralph Rhoda, the Kellond principal, served as spokesman, noting neighbors had been working since 1957 for an East Side library. Opponents argued park sites were risky for women and children at night,

and that there was limited access compared to a major arterial.

The site was located at its current Wilmot location in January 1964.

Want to Build a Labyrinth? Mark your calendar for Sept. 14

A subcommittee working on plans for the labyrinth on the parcel east of the park has set a build date.

Neighbors who would like to participate have two options:

- 1) Helping us place about three bathtubs full of rocks into the design.
- 2) Painting rocks to motivate and inspire those enjoying the site. Labyrinths are an ancient symbol that for many, represent a purposeful journey and may be useful to facilitate meditation or prayer.

For those coming to the build, we will respect physical distance and ask that participants wear face coverings.

Get out those paintbrushes and we'll keep you posted as we get closer.


