#### THE HISTORY HUB

Palo Verde Park Neighborhood was smack in the middle of a so-called "Boom Center" that had about 14,500 residents as of the end of 1957. The four-mile area, bounded by Craycroft to Kolb and Broadway to 36th had only 250 residents just eight years prior. It was considered the fastest-growing community in a region already experiencing a steady population increase.

The growth not only fueled the need for additional school space, but also for health care needs. St Josephs Hospital opened on July 12, 1961, with the first patient a 72-year-old East Sider admitted for surgery.

The hospital opened with 130 beds, but planned for an eventual capacity of 450 to accommodate new growth.

# Please Be a Considerate Neighbor: Pick Up After Your Pet

But did you know that animal

But did you know that animal waste can actually be hazardous to the health of children and other pets using the park?
Fecal matter is one of the most common forms of disease transmission between dogs and a source of harmful organisms such as E. coli, Cryptosporidium, Giardia, and Salmonella. Rain and sprinkler runoff may carry the waste to other areas.


Please pick up after your pet.

According to Tucson Code Chapter 4-102, fines of up to \$750 may be assessed against an owner who doesn't immediately dispose of their pets' solid waste.
